Drug & Alcohol Policy: Drug-Free Schools & Communities Act of 1989



Regulatory Policy – no exceptions may be made.

PURPOSE

Concorde Career College Institute aims to provide an environment of academic success, health, and safety for students, employees, and visitors. All Concorde Career College Institute locations are drug- and alcohol-free, prohibiting the consumption of alcohol or use of drugs while on campus or at an off-campus site where education is delivered such as an extern or clinical education facility.

POLICY

The Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act of 1989 (Public Law 101- 226) requires institutions receiving federal financial assistance to implement and enforce drug prevention programs and policies. As a matter of policy, the Institution prohibits the manufacture and unlawful possession, use, or distribution of illicit drugs, prescription medications and alcohol by students, employees, and any other parties on its property or at any College sponsored or College related activity. Any violation of this policy will result in appropriate disciplinary actions up to and including expulsion (in the case of students) and termination (in the case of employees), even for a first offense. Where it is apparent that a violation of the law has occurred; the appropriate law enforcement authorities will be notified.

ABUSE PREVENTION PROGRAM

Concorde recognizes drug and alcohol dependency to be an illness and a major health problem. The institution also distinguishes drug abuse as a potential health, safety, and security problem. Prevention and early intervention strategies can reduce the impact of substance abuse. To support this initiative:

- Students and employees are provided information during orientation regarding the drug and alcohol prevention resources and are encouraged to seek assistance when needed.
- Annual disclosures will be emailed to each student and employee to include:
 - o a description of the health risks associated with the use of illicit drugs and alcohol,
 - o standards of conduct
 - sanctions under federal, state, local law,
 - o campus policy
 - o information on preventing drug and alcohol abuse, and
 - available counseling and treatment options

Students needing assistance in dealing with drug/alcohol dependency are encouraged to make contact with campus Student Affairs who can provide confidential counseling referrals, assistance, or information. Employees needing

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assistance in dealing with such problems are encouraged to utilize the Employee Assistance Program or other appropriate counseling services. Conscientious efforts to seek such help will not jeopardize employment. Several appropriate local resources are also available and may be contacted directly for assistance.

STANDARD OF CONDUCT

The consumption and/or possession of any alcoholic beverage by any person under the age of 21 years of age is forbidden as provided by state law and campus regulations. The Institution prohibits the use, possession, manufacture, sale, or distribution by its students, faculty, or staff of any illegal drugs. All federal and state drug laws will be enforced.

In certain cases, students or employees may be referred to counseling sources and/or substance abuse help centers to take part, at their own expense, in an appropriate counseling or treatment program. If such a referral is made, continued enrollment or employment will be subject to successful completion of any prescribed counseling or treatment program. These programs may vary from state to state.

Sanctions for Violation of the Standard of Conduct:

Concorde will impose sanctions on students and employees for violations of the drug and alcohol standards of conduct consistent with federal, state, local law, and campus policy. Consistent with the severity of the violation, sanctions may include:

- · reprimand and warning.
- substance abuse counseling, treatment, or rehabilitation program.
- immediate termination of enrollment or employment.
- referral to local law enforcement agencies for prosecution.

GUIDANCE

Employment Disclosure:

Students should be aware that substance abuse could result in impaired employment opportunities. Many employers now require pre-employment drug screening. Concorde cannot be held liable for graduates not being able to obtain work based on drug and/or alcohol use.

Health Risks:

The use of illicit drugs and alcohol erodes the capacity to perform, think, and act responsibly. Long-term abuse can have a profound effect on a person's health and well-being. Any form of such substance abuse is considered to create an extreme danger in the school to both students and others. It can be grounds for termination of enrollment or employment at this institution.

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Federal Penalties and Sanctions for Illegal Possession of a Controlled Substance:

The Federal Controlled Substances Act specifies penalties, for a first offense individual involved in the unlawful manufacturing, distribution, or possession with intent to distribute narcotics, of not fewer than 10 years or more than life imprisonment and a fine up to 4 million dollars, or both. The penalty for simple possession, knowingly or intentionally possessing a controlled substance, is imprisonment up to one year and a minimum fine of \$1000, or both. Penalties for unlawful distribution of a controlled substance to a person under twenty-one (21) years of age is imprisonment or a fine, or both, up to twice that established for distribution offenses.

State Laws:

Local, state, and federal laws provide for a variety of legal sanctions and penalties for the unlawful possession, use, or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol. Concorde enforces a "zero tolerance" policy regarding underage drinking and will enforce state underage drinking laws on its campus premises. (Note: The minimum legal drinking age in the United States is 21, with the exception that in Puerto Rico the minimum legal drinking age is 18.) The consumption and/or possession of any alcoholic beverage by any person under the age of 21 is prohibited.
